FACTSHEET INFORMATION

Summary of Invasiveness

- Syrian beancaper is an invasive plant that has the ability to create monocultures that inhibit the growth of nearby plant species, decreasing biodiversity.
- It is unpalatable to livestock, reducing grazing quality.

Description

- Herbaceous, perennial that can grow up to 3 feet tall and 3 feet wide.
- Plant is bushy and branches from a woody crown.
- Opposite, compound leaves are thick, leathery, hairless, and consist of two leaflets, giving it a Y-shaped appearance.
- Small, 5-petalled flowers are borne in the upper leaf axils and are yellow, copper-orange, or white with pinkish veins.
- Seed pods are 1.5 inches long, oblong, and ribbed.

Introduction and Movement

- Syrian beancaper is native to the Mediterranean region and Syrian desert, and was likely introduced as a seed contaminant.
- Inhabits deserts, dry grasslands, roadsides, disturbed areas, non-crop areas, and abandoned gardens.
- Reproduces by seed and vegetatively from lateral creeping roots, and root fragments.
- It can easily spread by seed dispersal, naturally by wind and water, or on human and animal vectors.

Prevention Strategy

- To prevent accidental introductions, learn how to identify Syrian beancaper and report any sightings.
- Make sure to remove and properly dispose of all seed and plant materials on vehicles, clothing, shoes and pets before you exit or enter outdoor recreational sites.
